Dear All

An awful lot has occurred since this time last week. Here we are 'slap-bang' in the middle of a time of flux. The announcement, by the government, that a phased return of primary schools, will commence from Monday 1st June, has certainly caused a stir! Any sort of change can be unsettling, but it seems especially disconcerting during this most *discombobulating* of times, (it is a real word you can check it in the dictionary)!

We've managed to get through the last few months pretty well as a school community, so I hope we can continue to work together effectively, to get through this next phase. I know this has been difficult for different people, in different ways. <u>Thank you and well done</u>, whatever your contribution.

I sent out a letter, earlier this week, asking for thoughts regarding 'returns' to school either on Monday June 1st or at some point thereafter. Mrs. Watkins has been co-ordinating your forms. I would like to thank her for all her hard work in doing this. I know she has endeavoured to answer all questions and concerns, as best she can, by return of e-mail. She has worked her little socks off and has been a great support to me. Thank you, Mrs. Watkins!

Thank you, also to all those who returned their forms by 13:00 today. The vast majority of forms were returned. They are a great help in planning the phased opening of the school. If you missed this deadline, or were unable to complete the form, please e-mail the relevant information to Mrs Watkins, as soon as possible. It **doesn't have to be on the actual form**. Meanwhile, I have been reading the government guidance, measuring the usable, floor space in all our classrooms and group rooms and beginning to draw up a risk assessment. Obviously, the fine detail is yet to be finalised. Once we have a better idea of how many children will be returning on or after Monday 1st June 2020, I will be able to share the 'nuts and bolts' with you. Some initial thoughts/ information to share with you...

- most of the classrooms can't fit more than 10 pupils in them, when the 2m rule is applied (except Robin Class, which is larger)
- most families are happy for their children to return to school, so this means a rota system, of some sort, will be necessary for many children
- full-time places will be allocated to the children of key workers and other designated groups first and then spread out as far as possible
- if the offer we can make, does not work for some individual families, then it may be necessary to ask the Local Authority to help us find alternative provision (places at another school / venue for some children)
- a staggered approach will need to be adopted to the beginning and the end of the day, so that adults can socially distance, we will take into account siblings
- currently, no-one will be penalised for not sending their child to school. The government is recommending the return of EYFS, Y1 and Y6 pupils on 1st June, but it is not a statutory requirement
- if, on June 1st and a place was requested, but there is a change of heart, that is OK with us. It is your prerogative to change your mind. Every individual must make their own decisions at this time
- please remember, if you change your mind at any point, for any reason, we will try to accommodate you at a later stage, but we may not be able to do this, 'at the drop of a hat'.

I will be in touch as soon as our plans are ready to share. I know Mrs Watkins wants to contact some families and have a chat with you about your particular circumstances, she will be on the phone and the e-mail next week!
