Hello Everyone,

I wanted to send you a little message to say that I hope that you are all well and to wish you a very Happy Easter!

I know that life under lockdown means that Easter felt very different this year, with many of us not being able to see our friends or other members of our family. However, I do hope that you were able to enjoy the time together and the amazing weather. Having given up chocolate for Lent, cracking open my Easter egg on Easter Sunday morning was a moment of pure happiness for me – let's not dwell on the fact that I then ate it in record time and felt rather full afterwards!

Whatever our beliefs, Easter is always about a celebration of new life and so is a hopeful time of year. The Christian celebration of Jesus's resurrection from the dead always coincides with the beginning of spring when we see the natural world come to life around us.
